

## Title : Current Issues in Korean Society

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Course Description:

This course aims at promoting students to have an overall understanding of Korea by focusing on selected contending issues in contemporary Korean society. Korea has made remarkable economic achievements and industrialization with comparable changes in social and cultural life. Korean politics has also revealed its unusual dynamics achieving political democracy while toppling down authoritarian regimes. The civil society in Korea is vibrant with burgeoning political democracy and growing civic participation. Contemporary Korea is open and globalized with its own culture and language. However, Korean society is not free from diverse political and social problems. Regional antagonism, ideological division, changing gender relationship, generation gap, demographic change and aging, political corruption, power tripping in work places, and enduring tension between North and South Korea are such issues that still haunt Korean society. This course will be a good opportunity to look into the diverse and dynamic aspects of rapidchanging Korean society for the students who are not well informed about Korean society, culture, and politics.

Assignments: Assignments will be given during the course with specific guidelines.
